Buses and walkers are buddies!

"We want people to walk," said Steve Spade, Director of Wichita Transit at a recent meeting of the Douglas Design District. Buses and walking can team up in Wichita, just like New York City and San Francisco.

Park the car this summer, hop on the free Qline and walk a few blocks to your entertainment destination such as an Intrust Arena concert or lunch in Old Town. Check out the new routes at www.wichitatransit.org/QLine.

Nationally, 80% of riders regularly access transit by walking, according to recent research from Harvard. Two reasons for the teamwork of walking and busing are health of neighbors and health of the economy.

Health and Safety: More people walking are more "eyes on the street," which reduces crime. People who walk for local errands are more likely to reach the U. S. Surgeon General's physical activity targets. Public transit is ten times safer per mile than traveling by car.

Enriches the Economy: Walking, cycling and transit can eliminate the household expense of one car, saving \$4,000 to \$6,000 annually. As a result, residents have more money to spend on local goods and services.

History in Delano

(Excerpts from "Baseball's Barnum")

When Raymond Harry Dumont was born that zero morning in 1904, a day after Christmas, he opened his big baby-blue eyes just long enough to make certain he was in the right town, Wichita.

Raymond was the only child of a family with limited means. His father, Charles Belmont Dumont, who sold building steel died relatively young. As an early bread-winner, he juggled three jobs at one time, but he did so with a smile so cheerful, even when he was weary, that a boyhood chum hung on the nickname "Happy", shortened soon to Hap, by which Wichita best knew and remembered him.

Dumont, as a kid, puny but peppy, was able to achieve free-admission to pro games by keeping score on the board of the old field at Ackerman's Island Park, located in the Arkansas and connected to the west bank by a trestle-type bridge. As first baseman for the Hyde Park United Brethren Sunday School, he tried baseball. The last of his many interesting youthful jobs was sporting goods and greatly increased his interest in baseball.

Over the years, Wichita has had a hard time keeping a professional baseball franchise, a fact that bothered Hap as a boy and annoyed him as a man. He was angry, and hurt, because Wichita would do more for athletic carpetbaggers who came to town with a franchise than the seat of Sedgwick County would for a native son. He was a man with a mission; that is to sell baseball to Wichita, which had lost professional baseball clubs regularly, and to help sell the game nationally.

During the depression, Hap tried to convince Wichita's city manager to build a municipal ballpark with public-works assistance, he guaranteed to put on a national non-pro tournament in his hometown. Wichita built the stadium that now has Hap's name as half of its hyphenated title shared by Robert Lawrence who owned the property on which the stadium is built "Lawrence-Dumont Stadium".

Graceful legendary black star barred by color line—Satchel Paige—was Ray Dumont's happy choice for proving first national tournament box office attraction,

The facts speak eloquently about baseball's Barnum and his impact on the game and his hometown. Over the years after his first state tournament—the 35 national before he died—the impact was so great that by 1989 the NBC could claim 1,600 top-tourney teams in its fifty-fourth year and more than 32,000 managers, coaches and payers. The glamour of the game spread to all 50 states once or many times in the 32-team, two-week tournament but 16 states achieved the national championship and four others went to the NBC finals. Moreover, close to 600 men who played once or more at Wichita used the tournament as a stepping-stone to the majors or, at least, could be called NBC alumni.

When Hap Dumont died at his desk on July 3rd 1971, he was surrounded in his cubbyhole bombshell office by scores of baseballs specifically made and stamped for the NBC. He was trying to arrange for Joe Garagiola to be his opening game celebrity.

Extended “Filling the Gap Lunches for Kids” program needs community help

Partners for Wichita, through its “Filling the Gap Lunches for Kids” program, is responding to an urgent need to provide healthy meals for hungry children, and needs the community’s help to supply those meals, at no cost to the children. The delayed start date for Wichita schools is putting children at risk for hunger again this summer. Partners for Wichita is extending the “Filling the Gap Lunches for Kids” summer schedule at its 17 sites. The start date at each site is based on the end dates of the summer “Kid Power Café” lunch programs nearby. By expanding its “Filling the Gap” schedule, Partners for Wichita needs the support of the community to help cover the additional \$10,000-\$12,000 cost of feeding about 800 children a day for another week.

“Filling the Gap Lunches for Kids” will serve Monday through Friday, July 31-August 18, from noon until 1:00 p.m. The Atwater Neighborhood Center site will have “Filling the Gap” meals available one week earlier, beginning on July 24. A few sites, where the summer USDA program covers the area until August 4, will be able to begin serving on August 7.

“Filling the Gap Lunches for Kids,” in partnership with Kansas Food Bank and hundreds of volunteers, serves children and youth ages 18 and under, who are at risk of going hungry during the week of spring break and the time between the end of the USDA summer lunch program and the start of school in the fall. The program is funded entirely by grants and donations. “Filling the Gap” typically serves over 800 children each day at its 17 sites in Wichita, Haysville and Oaklawn.

Since Wichita schools are starting a week later this year, Partners for Wichita is asking for community participation to help meet this increased need, and fill the gap for those children at risk of hunger.
